Funding uncertainty

I know many services have been waiting for advice and confirmation of future funding. I acknowledge the challenges this poses in terms of budgeting for 2025-2026, as well as supporting staff who are struggling with the uncertainty.

Q Shelter has continued advocating for certainty as a basis for service continuity, staff retention and the wellbeing of everyone involved. We have submitted our first agenda items to the Department of Housing and Public Works for the Regional Representatives' Forum to be held on June 19 and 20, and it includes a question for the government about how we can all ensure this level of uncertainty is prevented in the future.

The State of the Housing System Report

I urge everyone to <u>read this important report</u>. It highlights housing system challenges, and that we are falling short of delivering much-needed housing targets. At the same time, you can read about National Shelter's work to advocate for housing system reforms and investment. We remain involved and engaged at the national level to achieve optimal approaches to housing supply, and we continue to strongly advocate for a legislated national housing and homelessness plan.

Community support for social and affordable housing

Q Shelter works on many aspects of policy and investment to increase housing supply and to end homelessness. One factor that remains important is wider community support for housing diversity. I am aware that there are continued examples of organised community opposition to much-needed housing development. Q Shelter members are engaged in growth projects where local opposition is proving to be an additional challenge creating delays and reductions in yield.

This is why Q Shelter convened the Housing Diversity Community of Practice inclusive of diverse peak and industry bodies. This mechanism is intended to unite key organisations in our work to support housing diversity across Queensland to meet the needs of people struggling with homelessness and housing stress.

We need innovation in the management of public space

Q Shelter is working with key stakeholders including local governments, community legal organisations, our members, and other peak bodies to consider how we can optimally assist people living in public spaces such as parks. We know there is widespread community concern however we also know there are not enough homes to meet everyone's needs.

We always want to hear from members and stakeholders about how we can address people's needs in such a constrained housing market. We have the opportunity to be innovative, purposeful, and compassionate at a time when there are people who don't have suitable alternatives. We are also concerned about getting this right, well ahead of the Olympics and Paralympics to avoid practices in other cities where people are moved on without any genuinely permanent solutions to their housing needs. It is why we are advocating strongly for accelerated delivery of supportive housing throughout Queensland and more youth foyers. The delivery of 53,500 social homes is also critical.

An opportunity for CHPs in Meadowbrook



Economic Development Queensland (EDQ) has opened a <u>Registrations of Interest</u> (<u>ROI) process</u> for two distinct opportunities in Meadowbrook, Queensland:

• Opportunity 1, open to eligible CHPs, involves acquiring 0.48ha to develop social and affordable housing with government support available.

 Opportunity 2 involves purchasing up to 3ha of residential-enabled land for future development.

EDQ will seek to appoint either a single proponent for both opportunities or separate proponents for each, depending on the outcomes of a subsequent Request for Proposal (RFP) process. There are more details available on the EDQ flyer at this link.

Registration is free and submissions close **5:00pm AEST Friday 13 June 2025**. After <u>completing the ROI</u>, eligible participants will be invited to participate in the RFP process, which will provide detailed information about the opportunity

Q Shelter is <u>seeking expressions of interest</u> from professionals in the housing and homelessness sector to participate in **Empowering Futures**, a three-month mentoring program designed to strengthen capability, build leadership pathways, and foster professional support networks across the sector.

New Ministerial advisory subgroups

- South East Queensland Homelessness Working Group focused on improving coordination between local governments and state agencies across the SEQ region.

Micah Projects have several positions vacant, including for a <u>Tenant Service</u> <u>Worker</u> at Brisbane Common Ground.


