New federal government

Q Shelter welcomes the newly re-elected government and congratulates Prime Minister Albanese on a decisive win.

The new federal government has a decisive mandate. It is time to work through our national peaks and go back to the table. Housing delivery is not going fast enough and the supply of social and affordable housing is a long way from meeting current and emerging needs.

This requires a nationally coordinated approach with revised targets for housing supply, and a target for ending homelessness. It also requires whole of housing system measures and new technologies to build faster.

All of this needs to be underpinned by a structural approach to reducing poverty so that future generations have new opportunities to participate fully in the community while being safely and securely housed. It is time to ask the federal government to revisit their inquiry into the nature and extent of poverty in Australia, while also driving a nationally coordinated plan to address housing needs and homelessness.

We will be working through National Shelter to advocate for greater ambition and more investment in housing and homelessness solutions.

Homelessness Ministerial Advisory Council

Soon I will join HMAC and continue to advocate for genuine prevention rather than persistent crisis management. We all need to go to the table with clear and achievable solutions. We can't continue to state the problem without tangible ideas for how to solve our challenges.

I am pleased that in preparation for the first meeting we have been asked to think about solutions and high priority activities that will help now and in the future. We congratulate the Hon Sam O'Connor on this initiative and we will work hard to support its success.

Preventing exits from institutional care into homelessness

This week, more than 150 people attended our workshop, **Preventing Exits from Institutions to Homelessness Forum**, as part of our Synthesis Series.

The forum included people from specialist homelessness services, health, immigration and refugee support, justice and corrections and government agencies. It was a unique opportunity to discuss the core issues and challenges, brainstorm practical approaches that can be implemented, and consider 'what's next' in working to reduce the risk of homelessness for these vulnerable populations.

Having <u>Indi Tansey</u> on-site allowed us to capture a visual storyboard of the discussions and feedback from the forum, and we're excited to share Indi's first video clip from below, with more resources to follow.



The discussions from the forum will inform Q Shelter's work and policy recommendations towards reducing unmet housing need and homelessness, and the follow-on reports and resources will join <u>those from others in the Synthesis</u> <u>Series events on The Deck</u>.



Affordable housing opportunity, North Qld

Economic Development Queensland has put out a call for registrations of interest from suitably qualified Community Housing Providers to build, own, and operate an affordable housing rental project in Oonoonba, Townsville.

The project includes potential to acquire an approximate 2-hectare site, and to obtain grant funding for development of the site.

The preliminary registration of interest is free, but submissions close this **Friday 9 May**. After completing the ROI, eligible participants will be invited to respond to a Request for Proposal, which will provide detailed information about the opportunity. Inclusive Language Guide

As a significant percentage of housing and homelessness support services users are from marginalised and vulnerable populations, it is crucial organisations and individuals create a safe space where everyone feels respected. Using inclusive, person-centred language plays a major role in ensuring people feel respected and included.

Q Shelter has developed <u>a Language Guide to assist the housing and</u> <u>homelessness sector</u> use inclusive, person-centred language in all interactions, particularly with people seeking support. Sector Orientation training
